Comments from Senator Joe Leibham--6.17.2011

~ 2011-2013 State Budget Proposal Passes Legislature ~

After over four months of public discussion and legislative debate the Wisconsin State Senate and Assembly have given final approval to a new two-year state budget. The biennial budget will run from July 1, 2011 to June 30, 2013.

As your State Senator and as a member of the legislature's Joint Finance Committee (JFC), I have been humbled by the responsibility of developing a budget plan that is fiscally responsible and focused on the priorities of our state during this time of economic challenge. Without a doubt it has been an intense but rewarding experience.



While I wish a number of items would have been handled differently, I believe this budget takes our state in a new and better direction. Like Wisconsin's hard working families, our government will finally live within its means. We will balance our budget by reforming our government and reducing spending.

We will continue to fund quality, effective government programs but at levels that are responsible and sustainable.

Most importantly, we will continue our efforts to improve the climate in our state for the creation of private sector jobs so our citizens can be employed, earn good incomes, support their families, and be less reliant on taxpayer subsidized entitlements.

For your reference, I have included a list of budget highlights below:

- Eliminates projected \$3.6 billion deficit and ends the biennium with our books balanced for the first time in almost 15 years
- Includes no tax or general fee increases actually reduces taxes by \$24 million
- Freezes property taxes for two years and permanently caps future increases
- Pays off bills left from past budget:
 - * \$235 million debt to the Patient Compensation Fund PAID
 - * \$59 million debt for Wisconsin Minnesota Tax Reciprocity - PAID
 - * Stabilizes transportation program by restoring

funds raided in past budgets

- Reduces state bonding by nearly \$2 billion
- Creates a better "Jobs Climate" by encouraging investment, small business start ups and entrepreneurism
- Restructures the Department of Commerce to focus on job creation instead of business regulation
- Public education funding remains the top priority of state tax funds
- Provides \$1.2 billion in state funds to fill hole left in Medical Assistance programs that were funded in last budget with one-time federal stimulus funds
- Maintains SeniorCare prescription drug program
- Requires participants of state government programs to be U.S. citizens
- Tightens eligibility for entitlement programs and focuses on eliminating fraud
- Funds military funeral honors program and invests in the Veterans Trust Fund
- Reinstates truth in sentencing for individuals who commit felony crimes
- Ends state funding to organizations that promote and perform abortions while investing in women's health and prenatal care
- Brings government wages and benefits more in line with private sector
- Eliminates numerous state mandates on local units of government
- Maintains Recycling, Stewardship Program, and Water Quality Standards




Comments from Senator Frank Lasee

Dear Manitowoc County GOP,

The Wisconsin Supreme Court negated the flawed,

political decision by Dane County Judge Maryann Sumi. Government collective bargaining reform is now in effect. This law change concerning government union reform was essential to making good on our commitment to bring fiscal sanity back to Wisconsin.





Reforms do not sit well with the entitlement crowd. When you have bus drivers and prison guards making more than the governor you've got problems. Green Bay teachers can retire at 55 with a full pension, work six more weeks and get an additional year's pay. That's the reason for this important reform.

Last week the Legislative Fiscal Bureau analyzed the proposed budget and reported that in just two years we're turning a \$3.6 billion deficit into a \$300 million surplus. We are doing this without accounting tricks, without one-time federal stimulus money and – most important – without raising taxes or fees. Contrast this with the last session, Democrats increased taxes and fees by \$4.8 billion and used another \$2 billion in federal stimulus money – and still left us with a \$3.6 billion deficit.

There is still some work to be done to pass this

budget. We're rolling up our sleeves to get it done and send it to Governor Walker's desk for signature.

This budget includes a two-year property tax freeze and doesn't increase fees. We're paying our \$200 million debt to the Patient Compensation Fund the Democrats raided and another \$59 million unpaid debt to Minnesota for our tax reciprocity agreement, another left-over bill from the Democrats.

In K-12 education, we will continue to spend more than \$10,000 per student on average, even with an average reduction of \$550 per student. Education is the biggest spending item in our budget. It accounts for about half of your property tax bill and it is nearly half of our general purpose tax money. Education remains the top priority of this legislature.

Wisconsin spends \$10,791 a year per student, while our neighboring states, Minnesota and Iowa, spend \$10,048 and \$9,520, respectively, according to the Census report on education. These states do as good or better job educating their kids for less. It is reasonable to bring our spending in line with theirs.

We Republicans have reset the spending priorities of this state. We're now a more business friendly state that is creating jobs. We are bucking a nationwide trend of unemployment ticking up. We've moved up 17 spots in a recent ranking of business friendly states by Chief Executive Magazine. That is a direct result of us getting government out of the way and letting people keep more of what they make.

Governor Walker and our Republican majorities are making good progress in the right direction with the most fiscally responsible budget in decades.



Dear Manitowoc County Republicans,

As the race for the 2012 GOP presidential nomination heats up, I want to discuss some important trends and strategies. First, it is still a wide open field. Back in 2007 I wrote in this column that McCain's candidacy was essentially dead, but he surprised everyone (except perhaps himself) by storming back in New Hampshire and winning the nomination. And just like in 2007, Mitt Romney is the frontrunner, although few seem super-enthused about his candidacy.

The big question that needs to be on the mind of the GOP is how they can get 270 electoral votes. In 2008, Barack Obama won 365 electoral votes and John McCain won only 173 electoral votes. Here is the map:



Obama's support in certain states he won in 2008 such as Virginia, North Carolina, Indiana, Iowa, Ohio, and Florida is tenuous for 2012. Colorado. New Mexico, Minnesota, and Wisconsin also have to be treated as "in play." President Obama's team is trying to focus on all those states he won in 2008, even selecting Charlotte, North Carolina as the location for the 2012 Democratic National Convention.



The GOP candidate who wins the nomination will need to always focus on strategy around winning 270 electoral votes. As a final point, whoever wins should seriously consider selecting Senator Marco Rubio of Florida as their running mate. He would excite the base, would help candidate's prospects in Florida, would not be easily lampooned by the media and Saturday Night Live, and his Cuban-American background would be helpful in states such as New Mexico and Colorado.

There is a lot of time left and a lot of work remaining.




